Serving and Learning in Arizona

"One of the best and most enlightening experiences of my life. It's definitely something I'll never forget." This is what one of the eleven students who participated in a service/mission trip in March 2010 had to say in reflecting upon the experience. The trip brought together students from Baldwin-Wallace College and the College of Wooster to share a week of service, reflection, and prayer at Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha Parish, South Tucson, Arizona. Maureen Masterson Carr, Director of Missionary Cenacle Volunteers (MCV) and a Newman Foundation board member, led the trip. What made this trip stand out among other service trip opportunities that many colleges and universities offer over spring break is MCV's emphasis on reflection, prayer, and relationships as well as direct service. In addition to helping to renovate an apartment area at Blessed Kateri Parish, the participants spent time getting to know members of the parish, learned about and experienced the rich Native American culture of the community, and devoted time each day to prayer and reflection. SPONSORED BY THE UNITED STATES CONFERENCE OF CATHOLIC BISHOPS

Every summer, students and campus ministers from around the country gather for a week of intensive training, planning, and prayer at the national Campus Ministry Leadership Institute (CMLI). In June 2010, thirty-five participants from the University of Akron, Case Western Reserve University, Oberlin College, Cleveland State University, Ashland University, and the College of Wooster attended the institute, making up nearly a fourth of the total participants! In addition to keynote lectures focusing on aspects of the U.S. Bishops' pastoral letter, Empowered by the Spirit: Campus Ministry Faces the Future, ** the institute includes intensive project work sessions in which each campus team spends focused time planning a project to benefit their campus community. These projects have included retreats, outreach to new students, liturgical celebrations, and service programs. Generous funding from the Newman Foundation makes it possible for campus ministries in the Diocese of Cleveland to offer this extraordinary leadership opportunity to students year after year, with incredible results not just in the spiritual and leadership development of those that participate in the institute, but to the wider campus communities they - Karen Hahn represent as well.

CMLI was a great experience. Not only did it help us in our foundations of planning a great student organization based on our faith, but it also incorporated aspects of a retreat while helping us grow as Catholics. There were many different types of prayer that. we learned about and got to experience since different people have different ways of worshiping. As an outcome of this year's Campus Ministry Institute (CMLI) those students in attendance: Maria Bedell, Michael Kulig, Andrew White, Justin Hummer and Vince Greczanik along with the remaining Leadership Team members have identified two major projects to enhance the spirituality of the individual and grow an understanding on how to provide an example of faith to the Real World.

First, heaven and earth are about to "COLLIDE": A weekend experience for students who want to explore how their individual spiritual beliefs and the Real World are sometimes at odds with each other and sometimes come together in the same space to make this world a better place. Young Catholic adults will come together off campus to COLLIDE with nature, friends and the Lord and to learn how to interact with each other and the world.



Second, XLT (pronounced "exalt") is a praise and worship experience unlike any other, geared toward young adults, and the young at heart to encounter Christ through Eucharistic adoration, inspiring Christian music, and a powerful speaker. In collaboration with St. Mary's, Hudson, and the parish of St. Bernard-St. Mary in Akron, the Newman Catholic Campus Ministry at The University of Akron is hoping to provide this praise and worship opportunity twice per year, in the Fall and Spring.

These projects along with weekly gatherings for prayer, bible study, spiritual direction, service and enlightenment from guests allow students to explore and enhance their faith beliefs and then add to the community at large and to the Newman Catholic Campus Ministry at the University of Akron.
