Vocations at the University of Akron. Hearing God's Call

In 2005 I began as Campus Minister in Akron and got to know the dedicated student leaders, Julie Hritz (now Sr. Julie), Jessie Houck and Mike Pataki. A core leadership team began to develop and took ownership of the ideals of Newman Campus Ministry. Together we were able to revive and revitalize the Akron Newman Campus Ministry program.

Julie, our president at the time, was actively discerning a call to religious life. As a Byzantine Catholic, Julie had a strong desire to remain active in the traditions of her church. When her bishop, Bishop John Kudrick of the Eparchy of Parma, wrote to her about his desire to start a monastery within the Eparchy (or diocese) of Parma, Julie knew that this was God's answer to her prayers. In the spring of 2009, Julie joined Sr. Celeste Strohmeyer who was helping to found the Christ the Bridegroom Community, in Burton, Ohio. She entered the novitiate in April of 2011, and continues her discernment
