Canonization of Cardinal John Henry Newman



October 13, 2019 marked the canonization of St. Cardinal John Henry Newman after whom the campus ministry program is named. On Oct 13, Bishop Nelson Perez presided over a celebratory Mass attended by students from Baldwin Wallace, Cleveland State, Case Western Reserve and Ashland universities, The University of Akron, Oberlin College and the College of Wooster. Campus chaplains concelebrated and students participated as lectors, musicians and gift bearers. Each student received a copy of *Meditations & Devotions* by St. John Henry Newman.

Bishop Perez Appoints Chaplains to Newman Campuses

Just before his departure for Philadelphia and his new assignment as Archbishop, Bishop Perez officially appointed chaplains to work with the campus ministers on each of the Newman campuses. Fr. Vince Hawk, pastor of St. Peter Loudonville, will remain the chaplain at Ashland University. Fr. Chris Zerucha, pastor of St. Bernard and St. Mary Akron, has been appointed to RooCatholic at the University of Akron. Fr. Chuck Butkowski, pastor of St. Adalbert Berea, has been assigned to Baldwin Wallace University. Fr. Joe Previte, pastor of Holy Rosary, has been assigned to Case Western Reserve University. Fr. Bob Marva, administrator for Historic St. Peter Church, was appointed to Cleveland State University. Fr. Rich Samide, parochial vicar at St. Mary Wooster, was appointed to the College of Wooster. Fr. Eric Garris, parochial vicar at St. Raphael in Bay Village, was appointed to Oberlin College. Chaplains assist with sacraments and programming and they participate in social activities. During the pandemic, many have been participating in Zoom Newman Nights.

Student Reflection

Meditations & Devotions by St. John Henry Newman has been a helpful resource for reflection and prayer. It is a compilation of meditations and devotions that Saint Newman used daily, divided into four sections: meditations for the month of May, meditations on the Stations of the Cross, meditations on Christian doctrine, and a section written in prospect of death. I have used the powerful reflections on the Stations of the Cross, and I am reading through his reflections on Christian doctrines. One of his writings that has stood out for me, especially because of the shelter in place order due to COVID 19, is "I will trust Him. Whatever, wherever I am, I can never be thrown away. If I am in sickness, my sickness may serve Him; in perplexity, my perplexity may serve Him; if I am in sorry, my sorry may serve Him ...". Overall, my transition to sheltering in place has not been very terrible. However, not being able to go to church or leave home during Lent, during Holy Week, and during Easter has been a challenge spiritually. These words are encouraging and thought-provoking: how can I, in not leaving the house, live to serve Him? If I am not able to do much at home, my inability to do anything may serve Him."

When at the end of one Newman Night, close to the end of fall semester, our campus minister A.J. Hoy announced that WooCatholic was organizing a trip to a mass in Spanish at St Agnes (Orrville) for the feast of Our Lady Guadalupe, I felt a strong mix of emotion, both yearning and homesickness. Since I came to the United States, as an international student, going to mass had become both a deep source of grace and love that has always been, but also a strong connection with my family back in my home country, Peru.

That night, after a small bus ride with the other members of WooCatholic, we arrived at a cheerfully decorated parish where the music ministers played, to my surprise, the same songs I had sung all my life; songs played on four guitars and everybody around me sang at the top of their voices. There is something special about saying the same prayers that you used to say as a child, there is something deeply comforting about saying them out loud with many others. There was something really special that night, between songs and prayers, nostalgia and celebration.

Maybe it is true that faith lives within culture; it is shaped and intertwined within traditions, in the words we said in our first sacraments, and in the songs we sing. For me, an international student, sharing that with my friends in WooCatholic, who were also there that night, even though they didn't speak Spanish, made me feel welcome and a part of a bigger community that shares a single faith.
